Admission Information

Highworth admits girls into Year 7 from about forty different primary schools in the area. The county selection procedure is used to assess students as suitable for a grammar school education. As a designated physical disability school, we offer selective places to girls with a range of physical disabilities, including wheelchair users. There are opportunities for prospective parents and their daughters to visit Highworth before they make their choice of secondary school during the Open Evening on the 22 October from 6.00 – 8.30pm and the Open Morning which takes place on 3rd November from 9.00 – 10.30am. Students (girls and boys) also join at 16+ to follow Sixth Form courses and girls can be admitted to other years following interviews, tests and the recommendation of their current school.

The school's planned admissions limit is 180. In the school year 2008 – 2009, we received 382 first choice applications before sitting the 11+ selection tests for places in Year 7.

Students are allowed to be on the school premises between 8.00am and 5.00pm. If taking part in a supervised after school activity, some students may stay later than 5.00pm, but parents will be notified in advance if this will be happening.

Uniform

Uniform is worn by students in Years 7 to 11 and we have a clear and strict uniform policy encouraging them to wear their uniform with pride as well as demonstrating a sense of belonging to the Highworth community.

General Requirements:

** Skirt or Trousers:

Plain mid-grey. School skirts and trousers should be a suitable style and length. Year 11 **only** may wear plain black, tailored, full length school trousers which are not denim or high street fashion style.

Blouse:

Pale blue, long or short sleeved **school blouse**, with revered collar. Button down pockets or collars are **not** uniform. Casual polo shirts are **not** uniform.

* Sweatshirt:

Years 7–10 **Highworth mid-grey** sweatshirt with school logo. Only Year 11 may wear a **Highworth black** jumper.

Outdoor Coat:

Plain dark coloured, not denim; Highworth School Fleece.

Shoes:

Black. Any sensible, comfortable style, with closed-in toes and heels. Heels should not be higher than 5cm. Boots may only be worn under trousers. **Trainers are not uniform.**

Ankle Socks or Tights: Grey, black or neutral.

Physical Education Kit:

* **PE Shirt: Sky blue,** short-sleeved polo shirt with collar.

* **Socks: Sky blue** knee length hockey socks and **white** ankle socks.

* **Shorts: Navy football-style.**

* **Skort: Navy (skirt with inner short).**

* **Tracksuit Trousers: Navy.**

* **Fleece Top: Navy.**

Trainers: Any proper sports style, not fashion trainers.

Shin Pads and Mouth Guards: Recommended for hockey and football.

** We recommend that you purchase these items from our uniform supplier or any other supplier.

Additional Expectations:

Hair: One **natural** colour.

Hair Accessories: Blue, black, white or grey. Unobtrusive.

Jewellery: One pair of unobtrusive stud earrings. One wrist watch. Nose and body piercing is **not** allowed for health and safety reasons.

Make-up: It is **not** appropriate to wear make-up in school.

Curriculum 2009 – 2010

Our curriculum aims to provide continuity between the key stages, whilst also offering new challenges and opportunities for students moving into the next stage of their education. It is delivered via sixty periods over a two week cycle in suited accommodation which makes use of excellent facilities.

The Key Stage 3 Curriculum

- A very broad range of subjects is studied including Dance and Drama.
- ICT is taught as a discrete subject in Years 7 and 8 and the skills learned are reinforced and developed in other subjects. Girls begin their GCSE courses in Religious Studies and ICT in Year 9.
- All girls study French, German and Spanish during Year 7 before choosing to specialise in two of these languages.
- There is an extensive and comprehensive Design Technology programme throughout the key stage, making use of excellent facilities.
- All girls study Science as three separate subjects in Year 9.
- All girls follow a programme of Physical, Social and Health Education (PSHE), Religious Education and Physical Education, with Citizenship being incorporated into the curriculum.

The Key Stage 4 Curriculum

- The core subjects of English (Language and Literature), Science (Science GCSE or three separate sciences), Mathematics, ICT and Religious Studies are followed by all students.
- Provision is made for a broad choice of option subjects. All girls are very much encouraged to follow courses in a Modern Foreign language and a humanities subject.
- All girls follow a programme of Physical, Social and Health Education (PSHE) and Physical Education, with Citizenship being incorporated into the curriculum.

Full GCSE Option Courses are offered in the following subjects:

Art, Business Studies, Dance, Drama, French, Geography, German, History (both Sixteenth and Twentieth Century), Information Communication Technology, Media Studies, Music, Physical Education, Religious Studies, Spanish, Design Technology (Food, Graphics, Textiles, Resistant Materials).

The Key Stage 5 Curriculum

- Over 30 AS, leading to A2 level, subjects are offered:
Archaeology, Art, Biology, Business Studies, Chemistry, Critical Thinking, Dance, Film Studies, Food Technology, English Literature, French, Further Mathematics, General Studies, Geography, German, Government and Politics, History (both Sixteenth and Seventeenth Centuries and Twentieth Century), Human Biology, ICT, Mathematics, Music, Music Technology, Performing Arts, Photography, Physical Education, Physics, Product Design, Psychology, Religious Studies, Sociology, Spanish, Textiles and Theatre Studies.
- Vocational A Levels in Health and Social Care and Business Studies are available.
- The Creative and Media Diploma Level 3 is offered.
- Students have the opportunity to follow a course in the Certificate of Financial Studies.
- Careers counselling forms part of an interesting Physical, Social and Health Education programme which also covers topics as varied as well-woman issues, local politics and personal safety.
- Whole day conferences raise awareness of other current moral and ethical issues.
- Compulsory Supplementary Study in Year 12 encourages students to develop good study habits.
- Community Volunteering and Work Experience enable students to gain valuable new insights and skills.

Religious Education and Collective Worship

Assemblies take place regularly along with personal mentor meetings. Assemblies may be taken by the Headteacher, staff or students, are non-denominational and are intended to give an opportunity for collective worship, consideration of moral issues, personal reflection and the celebration of success and achievement.

All Year 7–11 girls attend Religious Education lessons unless they have been withdrawn at their parents' written request. Religious Studies can be taken to GCSE and AS/A2 level, whilst Religious Education in the Sixth Form is provided by regular conferences.

Additional Educational Needs

Highworth is committed to meeting the needs of all our students irrespective of disability, gender or race. Students with special needs are identified and provision is made for their inclusion into all areas of the curriculum wherever possible whilst recognising the need to liaise with outside agencies to offer relevant and positive support.

The nature of the school's intake, based on the optional 11+ selection procedure, results in us having many gifted and talented students and we do much to develop their potential both within the curriculum and as extensions to it.
